Creative Necessity

Bill Shannon



Bill Shannon is an interdisciplinary performing/creative artist (dancer, illustrator, actor, sculptor, multimedia artist, and skateboarder) whose work challenges views of art, performance and disability.

Over the past two decades his installations, performances, choreography and video work have been presented nationally and internationally at numerous venues, festivals and events. Bill also completed a project with Cirque du Soleil where he choreographed an aerial duet and a solo on crutches for their 2002 production "Varekai", which continues to tour into 2010.

Born in Nashville, Tennessee in 1970, Bill was diagnosed with Perthes disease at a young age. In 1992 he attended the Art Institute of Chicago, earning a BFA in 1995. In 1996 he moved to NYC and immersed himself in the art, dance and skate cultures of Brooklyn and Manhattan while expanding his performance work to multimedia video installations, group choreography and the theater arts. In 2005 Bill moved back to his childhood home of Pittsburgh, PA with his wife Leah to participate in his extended families urban farming project, Mildreds Daughters Urban Farm while raising their two children Arto and Rio.

As of 2010, Bill performs publicly on a project by project basis while also working on a book project and new media projects. He continues the evolution of his technique of dance on crutches via spontaneous street skating sessions through the city to local spots with smooth top surfaces.

Dis-Ease: A Coming Out

Davy Sturtevant



Davy Sturtevant has been praised by critics, musicians, mental health professionals and consumers alike for his work as a folk musician. Davy sings and accompanies himself on acoustic, electric, and resophonic guitars, banjo, mandolin and fiddle. His songs have been recorded and performed by other nationally touring folk musicians including Joe Stead, Dan Duggan, John Kirk, Neal and Leandra, and Sue Trainor.

For over a decade, the work of the duo Armor and Sturtevant involved composing and performing and to writing songs inspired and influenced by various folk traditions, classical music, bluegrass, rock 'n roll, and jazz. Their CDs on the Tatema Music label garnered air play on folk radio programs nationwide and internationally. A 2001 sabbatical in East Africa enabled the duo to collect recordings of choirs and traditional drumming ensembles. The highlights of those recordings have been released as a CD called Roho: Songs of the Spirit from East Africa.

In 2009 Davy collaborated with modern dance company SoMar DanceWorks to create and perform "Dis-Ease: A Coming Out", a music and dance show that outlines his personal experiences with Bipolar Disorder and its treatment. In 2010 Davy released a CD by the same name. It has been praised by mental health professionals, consumers, and musicians alike.

1. Medical Rehabilitation and Reform: Legislative and Regulatory Update

American Medical Rehabilitation Providers Association

This session reviews current developments related to implementing the healthcare reform proposals affecting rehabilitation providers, FY 2011 IRF-PPS notices, the bundling of acute and post acute care services, the Medicare 75% Rule study, post acute care payment reform demonstration and other research, and therapy caps as well as the current state-of-the-art medical necessity reviews.

2. Strategies for Purchasing Health Insurance in 2011 and Beyond

This session examines some of the challenges facing employers in the purchase of health insurance for their employees. This session discusses the impact of healthcare reform and provides strategies to position organizations for success. This session provides an overview of a proven purchasing model that offers flexibility, mitigates risk and provides long term price stability.

3. The Medicaid Infrastructure Grant (MIG)

PA Office of Developmental Programs Consulting System

This session provides an overview of the Medicaid Infrastructure Grant (MIG) and how the MIG funding is intended to facilitate the competitive employment of people with disabilities. This session describes comprehensive coordinated approaches across programs to remove barriers to employment for individuals with disabilities, including innovative professional development efforts.

4. Meeting the Management Needs of the Present and Future: A CRP Simulation

This session describes and demonstrates through group exercises the *Community Rehabilitation Program: A Leadership and Rehabilitation Management Simulation*. The simulation focuses on managing an \$8 million not-for-profit community rehabilitation program and uses a variety of means to present the learning exercises, such as the internet, small groups and DVD role plays. Participants make management decisions that impact on the operation's plans, budgeting, staffing, program services, organizational performance and customer satisfaction.

5. Community Services Partners - An Old Way is New Again

Not a day goes by without a report in the local newspaper of another community service organization closing programs due to a lack of funding. *U.S.A. Today* reports that over half of all non-profits will close their doors in the next decade. A service may be gone – but the need will only intensify. Organizations must find new ways to manage their business and still meet the growing needs. This session provides insights into old ways of doing business that are now being refined in a new era of technology and communications.

6. Bundling and the Impact of Healthcare Reform on Health Care Providers

This session focuses on the proposals for the bundling of health care providers that emerged during the healthcare reform debate and those proposals rehabilitation advocates currently are developing for implementation. This session also considers major issues of bundling that have an impact upon physicians.

7. Maximize Efficiency by Leveraging Technology

Mark Rieder, ethos Benefit Partners

Are your agency's benefits human resources administration processes as efficient as they can be? Does your agency spend time on non-value added activities? This session explores how adopting and implementing automated human resources administration technology can make you and your staff more productive.

8. Building Quality Management Strategy: Expectations and Roles

Dolores Frantz, PA Office of Developmental Programs

The PA Office of Developmental Programs (ODP) continues to apply ODP's guiding Quality Management (QM) Strategy including mission, vision, values, and quality framework to each of its programs. This session provides answers to frequently asked questions regarding ODP's QM Strategy: What definition is ODP using for quality? What distinguishes CMS Quality Framework from CMS Quality Assurances? Which is ODP using? How is ODP measuring quality? What are the expectations and roles of stakeholders, including providers, in supporting ODP's QM Strategy?

9. The CRP Simulation: The Decision Driven Organization - A Management Exercise

Robert Mather, Akron SCORE

Strategic thinking and strategic management are key features of the CRP Management Simulation. This session builds on the previous session and focuses on a pre-exercise in the CRP management simulation. Decision-making in organizations is a continuing process of identifying problems and opportunities and then choosing among alternative courses of action. Managers make many decisions in risky and uncertain environments where situations are ambiguous and the available information is limited. This session focuses on problem-solving incidents, to illustrate the concept of the decision-driven organization.

10. Developing and Growing Services for Workers with Disabilities: The New Jersey Experience

Nils Richardson and Floyd Nesse, ACCSES New Jersey

Vocational programs are working to establish new products and services to provide opportunities for employment of workers with disabilities. This session looks to the experience of programs in New Jersey that have developed services in conjunction with ACCSES New Jersey/CNA Services. The services that are fastest growing (document imaging and janitorial services), recently expanded (temporary employment services) and newly developed (call centers) will be presented.

11. The Future of Quality and Outcomes Measurement for Medical Rehabilitation

Bruce Gans, Kessler Institute for Rehabilitation

This session focuses on research currently being conducted by Medicare and its contractors on a theoretical framework for the measurement of quality and outcomes and describes the current status of the work of the American Medical Rehabilitation Providers Association (AMRPA) in proposing outcome and quality measures for inpatient rehabilitation hospitals and units (IRH/Us) and for the future Continuing Care Hospitals. Explanation will be provided of the likely approaches and measurements that will be required by payers, especially Medicare, to describe, assess and influence payment for inpatient rehabilitation services.

12. What to Do When the Government Comes Knocking

Renee Martin, Tsoules, Sweeney, Martin and Orr, LLC

No organization wants to believe it could ever have done anything to warrant a government investigation. Yet the reality is that any organization or provider can find itself faced with an investigation or whistleblower suit. This session provides helpful strategies for management of the investigation process and provides practical information on how properly to respond to such an investigation. Knowing how to respond and having a pre-existing plan helps assure that your organization's response is appropriate and minimizes the organization's exposure.

13. New Rules for ODP Services - Managing Fiscal and Operational Processes - Part One

PA Office of Developmental Programs**

This first of a two-part session provides updates from PA Office of Developmental Programs (ODP) bureau directors related to fiscal and operational processes. Participants have the opportunity to ask questions to obtain more clarification of the various new ODP processes.

14. Financial Statement Analysis for Executives

Lisa Ritter, Maher Duessel

This session demonstrates the value of the analysis of financial statements to service organizations and reviews key financial statement ratios used by banks in decision making for loans and in debt covenants. Strategies for improving ratios as well as loan collateral issues will be discussed.

15. Resources for Employment Reform

Corey Smith, VIA of the Lehigh Valley - Moderator

Technical assistance and training resources are being made available in Pennsylvania for developing community employment options for people with developmental disabilities. This session reviews the activity of the Employment Reform Resource Project and its work with several employment services groups in PA. This session discusses the challenges for providers of employment services in developing creative wage and self-employment options, obtaining alternative funding sources, and applying customized employment techniques to support more individuals who require personal assistance in the work place.

TUESDAY 3:30 PM - 4:45 PM

16. Health Care Reforms and Rehabilitation: A Roundtable and Recap

Carolyn Zollar, Bruce Gans and John Melvin

This session offers a roundtable discussion with national leaders in rehabilitation and post acute care on current policy proposals, reform requirements and practical responses from the rehabilitation field. The panel will discuss with session participants the options available for professionals and organizations in a reformed healthcare system.

17. Preparing Your Work Force

Thomas Weber, Goldberg Katzman, PC

This session focuses on maintaining consistent compliance with HIPAA privacy and security requirements as well as other regulatory provisions governing the industry. Attendees will better understand their obligations within the field as well as learn important training techniques for their work force. Identification of specific licensure requirements and an overview of the administrative disciplinary process will be covered. General employment principles and a mechanism to enhance risk avoidance associated with the work staff will be reviewed.

18. New Rules for ODP Services - Managing Fiscal and Operational Processes - Part Two

This second of a two-part session provides further discussion and updates from PA Office of Developmental Programs (ODP) Bureau Directors related to fiscal and operational processes. 19. Needs of Returning Combatants

This session begins with a general overview of what life in a war zone is like and then moves into an examination of what it is like to return to the US as combat veterans and the difficulties associated with reintegration. This session also examines the more specific issues and needs of wounded warriors as they attempt to re-enter and reintegrate into society even as they struggle with new physical, psychological and emotional challenges.

20. Creating a Community of Services for Persons with Autism Spectrum Disorder

Paul Andrew, CARF International

Throughout the world, autism spectrum disorder is being diagnosed in millions of children and youth. There is much controversy as to the causes and proactive treatments needed to serve this population and their families. Regardless of the confusion and misunderstanding, a responsive and thoughtful community needs to be built. This session illustrates the standards that can be used as blueprints for establishing and continuously improving community based services. Successful blueprints used for developing and managing employment services will be addressed. Among them will be employment transition, supported education and community employment services and supports.

21. Managing Vendor Physician Conflicts of Interests

John Washlick, Cozen O'Connor

Physician-vendor relationships are coming under greater and more intense scrutiny. Control over provider/vendor relationships increases as concern over potential conflicts of interest and undue influence grows. This session focuses on ethical considerations, current trends, regulatory scrutiny and compliance planning in managing vendor physician conflicts of interests.

22. Performance Appraisals - Yes, They Do Matter

Michael Cohen, Duane Morris, LLP

Now more than ever, letting your employees know how they are performing is one of the most important aspects of any manager's job. Whether the employee is doing a great job or needs significant improvement, it is critical that managers know how to document appropriately the employee's performance and realize the importance of carefully drafting the appraisal. This session explains why appraisals are important; describe the drafting process and identify common mistakes made in the drafting process. This session also identifies the legal risks associated with a manager's rushed or poorly worded appraisal.

23. Update on Psychiatric Rehabilitation in Pennsylvania

Dan Sylvester and Barbara Granger, Pennsylvania Psychiatric Rehabilitation Association (PAPSR)

Currently there is increased interest in the expansion of psychiatric rehabilitation (PR) services in Pennsylvania including PR services to be in-plan and the revision of PR regulations. This session focuses on key issues: (1) overview of PR services as different from other mental health services, (2) PA State regulations that define licensure for PR services and (3) approaches to funding PR services. In addition, this session presents key strategies to develop and maintain PR staff and connections across other mental health services within and between agencies/organizations.

24. New Markets/New Ventures after Healthcare Reform

David Feinberg and Jeffrey Bechtel, Feinberg Shopp Associates

Health care reform offers organizations new opportunities for developing health and human services. This session reviews specific prospects, identifies funding sources and discusses the approaches used by several organizations.

25. Creating Employment Environments

Joseph Pierangeli, United Rehabilitation Services, Inc.

Alice Sankey, Lark Enterprises, Inc.

Employment opportunities for people with disabilities are most difficult in an area with a 9.5% -10% unemployment rate, a minimal industrial base and limited local businesses. Lark Enterprises is creating environments that provide opportunities for persons with disabilities to be gainfully employed. Two types of businesses being pursued through Medicaid Infrastructure Grants are: (1) a recycling business and (2) a customer call center. United Rehabilitation Services, Inc. is working with the gaming industry to increase employment opportunities in this field. This session will discuss the types of activities that were accomplished via utilization of MIG funds.

26. RACs and Rehab - What You Need to Know

Suzanne Snyder, Carolinas Rehabilitation

This session provides an overview of Medicare recovery audit contractors (RACs), discusses how to respond to a RAC request, and explains how to most effectively appeal a RAC denial. This session draws on real life examples and experience of RAC activity at Carolinas Rehabilitation and the Carolinas Healthcare System.

27. Drafting Employee Handbooks – An Overview

Employee handbook! Don't have one? Get One! Have one? Time to update! Your organization's Employee Handbook provides a vehicle through which to provide your employees a roadmap for success as well as to convey to them the critical messages of your organization. With the constant changes in the law, your Employee Handbook will ensure compliance that the law requires. This session focuses on the subject matter that must be included in your handbook as well as those provisions that the prudent and forward looking employer should incorporate.

28. The Making of "Dis-Ease: a Coming Out"

Surviving a serious mental illness, creating an artistic work based on recovery from it, revealing one's personal challenges with mental health are not the life/career choices a high school guidance counselor promotes. Join Davy in an examination of the creative process that led to the making of *Dis-Ease: A Coming Out*.

29. From the Grassroots to the Capitol

Scott Johnson, S.R. Wojdak and Associates

The political landscape changes in 2011 as Pennsylvania elects a new governor and decides on the makeup of the state legislature. This session considers the current budget problems, policy concerns affecting health and human services and the choices to be made. This session will discuss constraints on legislators and the practical courses of action for advocates.

30. New Directions in Developmental Programs

This session offers an inside view of the Commonwealth's response to constraints in the state budget, waiver requirements as implemented by the federal government, changing needs of people with developmental disabilities and new approaches in administering person-centered services.

Attendees will learn how ODP is using electronic surveys to gather information to determine the need for statewide trainings and how a state professional association is working on training and standards in PR.

33. We Have an App for That! Effective Solutions for Workplace Disability Accommodation

This session presents an overview of the many workplace solutions, simple to complex, that allow people with disabilities to engage in active employment, sometimes for the first time ever. Some useful resources will be identified and current state-of-the-art workplace technology will be shown in hands-on demonstrations. During this session expect some “gee-wiz” and “what will be” as some of the major forces and trends driving technology are reviewed and take a sneak peak at some of the just-around-the-corner technologies that will soon help facilitate employment of people with disabilities.

34. Promising Practices in Serving Diverse Communities

41. Keeping up with the Rules for Inpatient Rehabilitation

Uniform Data Systems for Medical Rehabilitation

New rules, annual updates, transmittals, clarifications, and pricier changes as well as other new regulations and guidance are re-establishing the rules that inpatient rehabilitation programs (hospitals and units) must live by. This three-part six hour session provides attendees with in-depth exposure to regulations and policies surrounding the Inpatient Rehabilitation Facility Prospective Payment System (IRF PPS). This highly interactive seminar includes a review of IRF PPS regulations and an overview of Inpatient Rehabilitation Facility Patient Assessment Instrument (IRF-PAI) coding and rating guidelines. Best practices and operational issues, successful IRF PPS and interdepartmental education will be discussed.

THURSDAY 9:30 AM - 2:00 PM

42. A Practical Guide for Providers to Help Individuals with Disabilities to Access and Succeed in Post Secondary Education

Arlene Solomon and Roody McNair, Horizon House, Inc.

The unemployment rates for people with disabilities range from 65% to 85% and those who are employed often find only low-wage entry-level positions. Labor forecasts for Pennsylvania project that nearly 60% of job openings over the next ten years will require post secondary education. Individuals with a disability can successfully complete college and certificate programs if they have the right supports in place. In addition to existing college Disabilities Offices, provider agencies can link potential students to post secondary schools as well as offer additional needed services. This extended session will focus on the type of supports currently available and discuss how best to create additional supports through provider agencies. This three-part session will address a best practices approach to supported education, discuss what's happening in Pennsylvania, and review a variety of tools, including *Planning for Post Secondary School: A Beginner's Guide for Individuals with a Disability*. Strategies for creating supported education services on a limited budget will be presented.

43. A Real Life: Social Relationships and Community Integration for Survivors of Brain Injury

Jack Poplar, Acadia - Moderator

What is community integration? This session focuses on the responses of people with brain injuries, their families, and service providers to the question and identifies key indicators of community integration. The session provides recommendations for community programs and reviews the measures of community integration. Interventions for expansion of community integration are discussed.

44. Innovative Adult Programs and Regional Resources for Individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder

Erica Wexler, PA Bureau of Autism Services

The PA Department of Public Welfare, Bureau of Autism Services (BAS), recently released a final report outlining census data and projected numbers of individuals with autism throughout the Commonwealth. A regional needs assessment was also conducted, identifying statewide and regional challenges for consideration. BAS will share this data and discuss the implications of the information for those providing supports and services to this population. In response to the growing need of individuals with an autism spectrum disorder (ASD) that will transition to the adult system, BAS has developed innovative adult programs and resources to support individuals with an ASD, their families and the professionals working with them. This session will give BAS the opportunity to share information and respond to questions about its key initiatives, including the Adult Autism Waiver, Adult Community Autism Program (ACAP) and Regional ASERT collaborations.

45. PA Medicaid Waivers for Survivors of Brain Injury

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services has approved renewal of Pennsylvania's CommCare Waiver for individuals with a medically determined diagnosis of traumatic brain injury (TBI). The renewal will impact rate development and fiscal management of the program as well as services. The changes are likely to affect participants in the Pennsylvania program – those individuals with brain injury who are enrolled in the CommCare program as well as providers of brain injury services.
